EAST TEXAS GIVING DAY



Raises more than \$2.8M

Officials with the East Texas Communities Foundation announced more than \$2.8 million has been raised as a result of online fundraising efforts this past week to help nonprofit organizations throughout the region.

More than 5,600 organizations in East Texas received funds during the online event, held from 6 a.m.-12 midnight on Tuesday, April 26.

Based on preliminary results, donors contributed \$2,896,721 to support the causes they care about in 32 East Texas counties.

"East Texas residents stepped in a big way," said Kyle Penney, President of East Texas Communities Foundation, which host the online event. "Nonprofit organizations spent countless hours getting the word out about the needs facing our region. Donors across East Texas responded generously to meet the call. It's a community effort we can all be proud of."

During East Texas Giving Day, nonprofit organizations encouraged their donors and the public to make charitable donations online at www.EastTexasGivingDay.org.

Donors could choose among 295 participating charities and make donations starting at just \$10. Throughout the day, donations to select nonprofits were eligible to be matched thanks to the generosity of individuals and nonprofit business partners that had already pledged funds to the charities they support. Just shy of \$1 million in match was available on the East Texas Giving Day website.

East Texas Giving Day benefited nonprofits of all sizes. Preliminary results show, Northeast Texas Community College Foundation from Titus County with \$135,000 raised. Two Smith County charities followed with Breckenridge Village of Tyler receiving \$126,211, followed by Mentoring Alliance raising \$104,389.

Good Shepherd Reformed Episcopal School received the most overall donations. Their 348 separate donations yielded a total of \$98,180 for the Smith County school.

East Texas Communities Foundation is a nonprofit corporation serving 32 counties in East Texas. The Foundation distributed \$17.2 million in grants in 2021 and currently manages over \$133 million in over 400 unique charitable funds which support non-profit organizations and student scholarships. The Foundation, which was formed in 1989, has awarded over \$121 million in grants and scholarships since its inception. Philanthropy builds community and changes lives. East Texas Communities Foundation supports philanthropy by offering simple ways for donors to achieve their charitable goals.

Lindale Police recognizes local Badge of Honor participants

Lindale Police Department officials presented plaques of appreciation to several local restaurants as well as Lindale United Methodist Church on April 20 for their support of recent Badge of Honor events, officials said.

Lindale FUMC Senior Pastor Michael Peschke accepted the plaque for his church, while Bonnie Havens, hospitality director for Chick-Fil-A accepted its plaque and Craig Wood accepted the plaque for Brisket Love.

Officials will deliver the plaque to Stanley's Barbecue.

"We would like to thank all these community partners for their continued support for such a great program," said Lindale Police Chief Dan Somes.

Smith County Sheriff's Office finds non-compliant registered sex offenders

Smith County Sheriff's Office investigators have identified five out of compliance registered sex offenders in the county out of 459 checked, said spokesman Larry Christian.

The Sheriff's Office conducted the compliance check of all registered sex offenders in the county on Wednesday, April 27 and Thursday, April 28.

Warrants were issued for the five found to be non-compliant, Christian said.

"Verification checks send a message to all sex offenders that they will be arrested if they are out of compliance with their sex offender registration requirements," said Smith County Sheriff Larry Smith. "An offender has strict requirements. If they violate any of their sex offender registration requirements, a warrant will be issued for their arrest."

The verification checks of this type are unannounced and comprehensive, Christian said.

The checks included members of different local, state and federal law enforcement agencies, coordinated with the U.S. Marshals Service Joint East Texas Fugitive Task Force.

Smith thanked those involved for making sure the verification process was successful.

"It took three days to conduct this verification check, but it took a lot of hours of planning and coordination to make it happen," he said. "Having the right people and the right number of people assigned to this effort was key and I am grateful to each one of them for their hard work."

Participating agencies included the Smith County Sheriff's Office CID Unit, Tyler Police Department, Texas Department of Criminal Justice-OIG, U.S. Marshal's Service, and U.S. Marshals Task Force Officers.

Sex Offender registrations, as well as the compliance checks, are coordinated by Smith County Sheriff's Investigator JeriLynn Scott.

State Sales Tax Revenue totaled \$3.8 Billion in April

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar this week said state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.83 billion in April, 12.8 percent more than in April 2021.

The majority of April sales tax revenue is based on sales made in March and remitted to the agency in April.

"State sales tax collections reached a new high for the month of April, with double-digit growth reflecting both inflation and continued expansion in real economic activity and employment," Hegar said.

"The strongest growth was in receipts from sectors driven by business spending, particularly the oil and gas mining sector, which surpassed pre-pandemic levels as capital spending in the sector picks up. Receipts from the construction, manufacturing and wholesale trade sectors continued to show double-digit growth.

"Among sectors driven by consumer spending, the strongest growth in receipts was in arts and recreation services, with receipts from sporting events, music and other live entertainment, and fitness clubs far exceeding previous year levels. Receipts from restaurants continued to exhibit double-digit growth as well.

"Receipts from retail trade remain elevated, though only a little higher

than a year ago when retail spending surged after the end of COVID restrictions. Slowing growth in receipts from retail trade may signal shifts in consumer spending back toward pre-pandemic patterns. Growth in spending in segments that had benefited during the pandemic appeared to stall, as receipts from home improvement and furniture stores changed little from a year ago, while receipts from sporting goods and hobby stores declined."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in April 2022 was up 22.3 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 59 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$525 million, up 39 percent from April 2021;
- motor fuel taxes — \$335 million, up 3 percent from April 2021;
- oil production tax — \$666 million, the highest monthly collections on record, up 99 percent from April 2021;
- natural gas production tax — \$339 million, up 46 percent from April 2021;

Like the stock market, life is filled with ups and downs. Learning how to manage both time and finances in the midst of the chaos is a skill worth its weight in gold. Members of the 2021-2022 Texas Bank and Trust Student Board of Directors received an introduction to the world of investing and personal finance as they participated in the Bulls vs. Bears Stock Market Challenge, a game resurrected by popular demand from the Student Board program's history.

Students from Lindale High School were divided into investment teams, with a hypothetical balance of \$100,000 to manage over the course of the Student Board year. The students worked together to analyze live stock offerings, evaluate their options based on current market trends, and watch their investments change over time. Each board meeting allowed teams to compare their portfolio returns with those of their peers. While the teams did not get to keep the money when the program was over, the team with the highest return on their investments did receive a monetary reward at the last meeting in April.

The winning team for the Lindale Student Board of Directors was "The Money Bakers," which consisted of team captain Gavin James, Vivian Lehmann, Emily DeWolfe, Aaron Roden, Halle Lambert, and Emily Havens. The team increased their investment balance to \$108,508.70, a return of approximately 8.5 percent.

In addition to participating in the nine-month Bulls vs. Bears Stock Market Challenge, members of the Student Board learned the importance of preparing a resume that will get them noticed, proper etiquette for interviews and formal events, wise use of credit, and basic money management skills. The students also learned the importance of cyber security and how modern banking technology can enable them to control their personal finances more effectively.

Texas Bank and Trust rotates the Student Board of Directors program curriculum every two years to consistently provide relevant training for the program participants. Graduating seniors from Lindale High School were selected from a pool of applicants to serve on this year's board.

Realistically, of course, we know the hot weather will begin sooner than the end of June around these parts. Probably about the end of May or so.



Humans, from this uneducated perspective, are better equipped to handle warm and hot weather than cool and colder weather. We can cool down thanks to our sweat glands, while we must add layer after layer of clothing to ward off the chilling effects of winter.

Fortunately, now we know better.

About 10 or so years ago, I had to have minor surgery to remove a skin cancer lesion from the side of my face. Undoubtedly, I acquired the malady from riding around with the top down on my Jeep and not wearing a hat as often as I should.

From that point on, I wore a hat while in the Jeep and any other time I was in the sun. Used sunscreen more often as well, especially when we went swimming or fishing.

Getting our grandkids prepared for the pool has always included sunscreen. We slather and spray it on until they complain. Then we do it some more.

According to statistics, skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States and one in five Americans will suffer from it by the time they reach 70.

In East Texas we are fortunate to have a wealth of health professionals in our midst. One is registered nurse Tracy Whinery with UT Health in Quitman. She has passed

along some handy tips on how to ward off skin cancer while still being able to enjoy the outdoors this summer.

The month of May is dedicated to skin cancer awareness, she points out and offers some helpful tips on how to avoid the surgeon's knife.

Exposure to ultraviolet rays from the sun or even from tanning beds increases your risk for skin cancer.

It takes just 15 minutes of unprotected skin exposure to cause damage to skin. This damage, also known as photoaging, may not present until years later. It appears as wrinkles, changes in pigmentation, loss of elasticity, uneven skin texture and spider veins. This points to the importance of protection, not just in the summer but year-round when you are in the outdoors, even when it's cloudy.

She said we should use sunscreens with a Sun Protection Factor of 15 (the minimum amount) which helps counter ultra-violet rays.

Apply sunscreen every two hours and again after swimming or taking part in outdoor activities.

Wide brim hats, which shade your face, head, ears and neck are essential as well.

Find some shade during your outdoor activities to reduce exposure time or if its possible, choose a lightweight, long-sleeve cover-up. Sunglasses are another key item to have on hand while outdoors.

And she recommends avoiding tanning beds, which are sources of ultra-violet rays.

He carded an even-par score to punch his ticket to the NCAA Men's Golf Championship May 27-June 1 at Grayhawk Golf Club in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Texas State finished in 7th place among the 12 Sun Belt teams in the conference tournament. Regionals are scheduled for May 15-18 in College Station.

White, son of Bill and Kim White, was a two-time district champion while at Lindale High School.

"I'm so happy and proud of Evan White," Texas State men's golf head coach Shane Howell said.

"His career at Texas State has had some up and downs, but through it all he has continued to work hard and be a tremendous leader for Bobcat Golf."

Entering final round, White was in fourth place. In round three, White went two-under putting him at an even-par 216. He ended the tournament with eight birdies and led his team with the most pars, 35.

White had rounds of 72, 74 and 70 to win by three strokes over runner-up Anton Alberts of Arkansas-Little Rock (70-73-76—219). Georgia Southern's Ben Carr (74-71-75—220) and South Alabama's Jacob LeCroy (77-69-74—220) tied for third.

"We talk all the time, in our program, about leaving a mark on the program during your time at Texas State and Evan was going to do that whether or not he won (Tuesday)," Howell said. "This Sun Belt Individual Championship he won just leaves his mark on Texas State golf a little bit bigger now."
